

What a great year 2018 was for the Museum of Latin American Art (MOLAA)! It was truly a memorable year illustrated by the Museum's important achievements including the record-breaking Gala which boasted an income of over \$400,000 and featured the inaugural presentation of the LEGADO Award to Maestro Plácido Domingo. Triumphs such as this are only made possible thanks to the support of the donors and members like you, the Board of Directors, the staff, and the many dedicated docents and volunteers – an amazing team that I am privileged to be a part of.

Teamwork is essential in developing and implementing successful programming for all. That is why MOLAA maintains partnerships with many local, national, and international organizations including the Long Beach Opera, Smithsonian Institution, and the International Council of Museums.

Together we offered 10 innovative exhibitions enjoyed by almost 65,000 visitors. In addition, the newly established traveling exhibitions program increased the museum's national exposure in both New York and Miami. MOLAA's Education Program – funded by you – provided almost 200 tours and workshops attended by thousands of K-12 children, offering invaluable immersion with Latin American and Latino art.

MOLAA's permanent collection experienced a prolific increase with the addition of 27 works of art through acquisitions and gifts. We are also thrilled to announce the establishment of a \$300,000 acquisition fund which will allow the museum to further enhance its collection for years to come!

The future is bright for MOLAA as it continues to fulfill the newly-adopted strategic plan and strives to be the 21st century museum of Latin American and Latino Art. On behalf of the institution, I sincerely thank you and all of our supporters, including the Robert Gumbiner Foundation, the Arts Council for Long Beach, the City of Long Beach, and more for your longstanding generosity. We look forward to sharing another remarkable year at MOLAA with you!

MUSEUM OF LATIN AMERICAN ART

was founded by Dr. Robert Gumbiner in 1996. Located in Long Beach, California, it serves the greater Los Angeles area. MOLAA is the pioneering museum in the United States dedicated to modern and contemporary Latin American and Latino Art. The Museum's permanent collection now numbers over 1,600 works of art.

MOLAA's galleries were once a roller skating rink known as the Hippodrome built in the 1920's. After completing a \$10 million expansion and renovation, MOLAA unveiled its newly expanded campus in 2007. Designed by prominent Mexican architect Manuel Rosen, the "new" MOLAA reflects contemporary Latin American architecture and style. Two forty-foot rectangular arches architecturally reflect the expansion's "Bridge to the America's" theme. One arch symbolizes Latin America and the other the United States, reflecting the encounter and metaphoric bridge between the diverse cultures. The expansion more than doubled the Museum's physical capacity to 55,000 square feet, adding a 15,000 square foot sculpture garden.

EDUCATION

Developed to bridge the gap in arts education and to reach out to the community's economically and socially disadvantaged youth, APRENDE— MOLAA's core arts education program, engaged K-12 students through direct learning experiences.

Dozens of students attended MOLAA's Summer Art & Culture Camp where they combined STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) strategies to strengthen their abilities on important aspects of knowledge such as critical thinking, problem-solving, experimentation, and visual literacy.

These activities encouraged children and families of all backgrounds to explore diverse cultures. Thanks to your generous support, thousands of K-12 students including those with special needs, participated in the museum's school tours (13 of which were offered on a scholarship basis and workshops offered in both Spanish and English).







NATIONAL & INTERNATIONAL

Foro Mundial de la Gastronomia Mexicana vividly celebrated Mexican cuisine in North America with a successful event that attracted more than 17,000 visitors to MOLAA during August.

MOLAA's Argentina Travel Program invited an intimate group to explore the vibrant culture of Buenos Aires and to engage with artists and curators alike experiencing the unique perspective of the museum's President & CEO.



Featuring Latin jazz music, cocktails, hors d'oeuvres, and a fantastic silent auction, MOLAA's 2018 Annual Gala raised over \$400,000 to benefit the Museum's exhibitions and art education programs and became the most successful gala in the museum's history. With the Honorable Robert García, Mayor of the City of Long Beach, serving as the honorary host, this year's gala also featured a live auction of contemporary art, as well as an unforgettable performance by the Long Beach Symphony.




